

GETTING HOME SAFELY

Do not drink and drive! The blood alcohol level concentration limit in New South Wales has been set at 0.05 for most drivers, making it illegal to drive at or over 0.05.

Arrange a lift home with a non-drinker. It's a good idea to decide who will drive home before the evening starts.

Take a taxi. The taxi pick-up and drop-off point is located on the porte cochere (driveway) off Jones Bay Road.

Use public transport. Star City is easily accessible by the metro light rail, State Transit buses, the monorail and ferry services. Star City also provides shuttle buses which have convenient drop-off stops in the city.

For many of us, having a drink or two with friends is all part of having a good time.

Unfortunately some of our patrons occasionally over indulge in their drinking and become disruptive and anti social.

At Star City we are committed to providing you, your fellow patrons and our staff with a safe and secure entertainment environment, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

An important part of that commitment is ensuring our staff maintain responsible service of alcohol.

Star City has a responsible service of alcohol policy which sets guidelines for the service and consumption of alcohol.

- Star City reserves the right to refuse entry to people who are displaying signs of intoxication.
- The supply of alcohol is not permitted to minors, disorderly or intoxicated patrons.
- The consumption of alcohol is not permitted by minors, disorderly or intoxicated patrons.
- Star City and its employees will not permit intoxication or loud or unruly behaviour on or around the premises.
- Security staff are on site to maintain a safe and enjoyable environment.
- Star City actively promotes safe transport options to minimise drink driving in order to safeguard the well being of patrons.

WHAT IS AN INTOXICATED PERSON?

An intoxicated person usually displays some of the following behaviours:

- Loud, boisterous or disorderly;
- Bad tempered, aggressive or physically violent;
- Loss of co-ordination, i.e spilling drinks, fumbling with change, falling down or bumping into furniture;
- Decreased alertness, i.e dozing or sleeping at a bar or a table, rambling conversation, confusion or glassy eyed;

Any of the above behaviours will be used by Star City staff as indicators to determine if a patron is possibly intoxicated.



HOW MUCH CAN YOU DRINK?

Everyone reacts differently to alcohol. Your blood alcohol level may be quite different to someone else who has consumed the same amount of alcohol.

Certain external factors such as illness, some medications and missing meals can also affect the blood alcohol concentration reading.

Star City has installed breath test units for you to use as a guide to check your blood alcohol concentration. Breath test units are located in the lift lobbies of the car park and adjacent to the car park pay machines on the ground floor. However, the results of the breath test are a guide only and cannot be relied upon by you or used in any court case.

Another general guide is to count the number of drinks consumed. It is commonly accepted that men can remain under the legal limit if they consume no more than two standard drinks in the first hour and one each hour thereafter and, for women, no more than one drink each hour. However, the RTA recommends that you don't drink any alcohol at all if you plan to drive, because alcohol affects people differently and it is very difficult accurately to judge your blood alcohol concentration.

WHAT IS A STANDARD DRINK?

- 1 middy of beer (285ml)
- 2 middies of light beer (each 285ml)
- 1 nip of spirit such as brandy, whisky (30ml)
- 1 mixed drink such as brandy and dry, gin and tonic (1 x nip of spirit)
- 1 glass of red or white wine or champagne (150ml = 1.5 standard drinks)
- 1 glass fortified wine or port (60ml)
